We wish our special friends, and all the folks in our community, a "BLESSED HOLIDAY SEASON" and a "PEACEFUL AND HAPPY 2014!"





TWELFTH ANNUAL HORSEBACK RIDE-A-THON

The 2013 ANNUAL HORSEBACK RIDE-A-THON was held on October 6 under beautiful blue skies with no clouds in sight. The mountains were bright with color and the air had a fall chill that quickly warmed up. Trucks pulling horse trailers began rolling in around 7:00 a.m. They were greeted with the smells of a hearty breakfast of sausage gravy and biscuits, eggs, sausage, fried potatoes, and cinnamon rolls. Coffee and juice rounded out the bountiful breakfast. It was wonderful to hear the cheerful voices and the sounds of horses letting the world know that they had arrived. As in other years, Rev. Donnie Guthrie led an inspiring worship service before the forty-eight riders and horses began an 8.5 or a 15 mile ride up the mountainside. Also, like other years, the horses were amazed to see llamas in a nearby pasture, but they moved forward, not sure what those animals were supposed to be.

When the riders returned, they were again greeted with smells of homemade chili and vegetable beef soup, fresh bread, cornbread, sweet tea, fresh apple cider, and assorted pies. This year a new item was added to the menu, grilled cheese sandwiches. It was a hit! Patti Clontz, Jan Maasch's niece who traveled to Still Meadows from Michigan, organized the kitchen and prepared food all weekend with Rick Smith at the grill. Other volunteers helped with serving food, cleanup, pie making, registration, trail safety and communication, and many more tasks.
